CHOOSING PIECES FOR DECLAMATION

First of all, when looking for Declamation pieces you must be very specific and make sure that the piece fits the guidelines.

Guidelines:

- 1. Must be a speech that has been previously given or an OO.
- 2. Must know when it was given, who it was given by, and it is good to know where it was given.
- 3. Show your teacher the piece that you are interested in to make sure that it is legit, and that you are able to do the piece.
- 4. ALWAYS check with your teacher to make sure that your piece fits the standard.

When looking for a Declamation piece you can look on-line, in the back room, TV speeches given by actors, political candidates. You can do the speech as long as it has been given by someone.
