

**A Bill to Impose Fees on Remittance Transfers
to Fund Immigration Reform**

1 Be it enacted by this Palm Beach Catholic Forensic League Student Congress here
2 assembled that:

3 **Article I.** A fee equal to 10 percent of the remittance dollar amount shall be imposed
4 on the sender of all remittance transfers.

5 **Article II.** “Remittance transfer” shall be defined as any electronic transfer of funds
6 from a sender to a designated recipient that is sent by a remittance transfer
7 provider.

8 **Article III.** This legislation will go into effect on June 1, 2024.

9 **Article IV.** The Department of Treasury, in conjunction with the Consumer Financial
10 Protection Bureau and remittance transfer providers, shall develop and
11 make available a system for remittance transfer providers to submit the
12 remittance transfer fees collected in accordance with section 3344(b) of
13 title 31, United States Code. The funds collected shall be allocated to the
14 annual budget of the Department of Homeland Security in order to fund
15 immigration reform, which includes, but is not limited to, border security
16 and addressing court backlog.

17 **Article V.** All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

The Undocumented Immigration Relocation Act

1 Be it enacted by this Palm Beach Catholic Forensic League Student Congress here
2 assembled that:

3 Article I To alleviate overpopulation and expedite naturalization, incoming and
4 current undocumented immigrants will be incentivized to move to lesser
5 populated states by providing automatic work visas and easing their
6 process of citizenship by absorbing the cost. Immigrants will choose a
7 lesser populated state to relocate to and be provided with a monthly
8 stipend to help with relocation costs for 18 months. Upon relocation,
9 immigrants will be required to maintain residence in that state for five
10 years.

11 Article II Let these definitions clarify:

- 12 a Lesser Populated States: states with less than 50 people per square
13 mile
14 b. Undocumented Immigrants: An immigrant who resides in the
15 United States without legal status.
16 c. Monthly Stipend: a fixed amount of money offered to employees
17 to help pay for work expenses, travel expenses, living expenses,
18 wellness expenses, and more.

19 Article III U.S. Citizenship and Immigration Services (USCIS) will oversee this
20 process by creating a sub department that will prioritize this relocation and
21 incentivization process.

- 22 a. This amount of the monthly stipend will be determined by the U.S.
23 Citizenship and Immigration Services (USCIS) branch of the
24 Department of Homeland Security (DHS).
25 b. The USCIS will take into account the amount of people in the
26 immigrant's family and the average cost of day to day life.

27 Article IV This legislation will take effect on January 1st, 2025.

28 Article V All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

A Bill to Implement AI in K-12 Education

1 Be it enacted by the Palm Beach Catholic Forensic League Student
2 Congress here assembled that:

3 Article I The new policy aims to integrate AI technologies into K-12
4 education to enhance learning outcomes, improve
5 personalized instruction, and foster innovative teaching
6 methodologies.

7 Article II “Artificial Intelligence” (AI) refers to the simulation of
8 human intelligence processes by computer systems,
9 including machine learning, natural language processing,
10 and computer vision.

11 Article III The Department of Education, in collaboration with the National
12 Institute of Technology Advancement (NITA), shall oversee AI
13 implementation in K-12 education. A dedicated division within the
14 Department of Education will monitor, evaluate, and regulate AI
15 applications in educational settings.

16 A. The Department of Education shall issue guidelines and
17 standards for the ethical use of AI in K-12 education,
18 ensuring student data privacy and safeguarding against
19 biases or discrimination.

20 B. NITA will provide grants and support for
21 educational institutions to adopt and integrate AI
22 technologies in curricula, teacher training programs,
23 and administrative processes.

24 C. Educational institutions have until July 1, 2027, to
25 implement AI technologies and comply with the
26 outlined guidelines.

27 Article IV This legislation takes effect on July 1, 2025.

28 Article V All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared
29 null and void.

A Bill to Require Comprehensive Sexual Education Courses in Middle & High School

1 Be it enacted by this Palm Beach Catholic Forensic League Student Congress here
2 assembled that:

3 Article I: All middle & high schools should have a one week sexual education
4 course during school hours in order to educate young teenagers about the 5
risks that sexual intercourse can bring.

6 Article II: Middle & High school is defined as students in grades 6-12.
7 Sexual education will be defined as fully comprehensive education
8 regarding sexual health and development for both heterosexual &
9 LGBTQIA+ individuals, as well as with curriculum discussing all forms 10
of family planning.

11 Article III: This legislation will go into effect on October 1st, 2025

12 Article IV: The U.S Department of Education will allocate \$500 million for the
13 development & distribution of nationwide standardized curriculum and
14 assessments

15 Article V: All other laws in conflict with this new policy shall be declared null and
16 void.

A Bill to Rehabilitate the Public Criminal Defense System

1 Be it enacted by this Palm Beach Catholic Forensic League Student Congress
2 here assembled that:

3 ARTICLE I Public defenders shall no longer be allowed to work
4 contemporaneously on more than 25 felony cases, or no more
5 than 60 misdemeanor cases.

6 ARTICLE II In the event that a public defender is taking a hybrid of felony
7 and misdemeanor cases contemporaneously, the public defender
8 shall be limited to 40 cases in total, while taking on less than 15
9 felony cases.

10 ARTICLE III The Department of Justice (DOJ) shall oversee the
11 implementation and enforcement of this bill.

12 A. The DOJ shall create a committee that will oversee the
13 allocation of funds to states to aid with the hiring of
14 more public defenders.

15 B. 2 billion dollars shall be allotted to this committee.

16 Article IV This legislation will take effect on FY25.

17 Article V All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null
18 and void.

A Resolution to Encourage Japan to Establish a Competitive Military

1 Whereas: Japan is impacted by the Article 9 of its Constitution and the
2 Treaty of Mutual Cooperation and Security between the United
3 States and Japan in a way that prohibits the establishment of an
4 offensive army, navy, or Air Force; and

5 Whereas: The people's republic of China and the Democratic People's
6 Republic of Korea have established offensive militaries for the
7 purpose of antagonizing the sphere of influence of the United
8 States; and

9 Whereas: The Japanese people if provoked could not defend themselves
10 which threatens their national sovereignty and the balance of
11 power in East Asia and subsequently the world; and

12 Whereas: The only solution is to give the Japanese government the authority
13 to establish a military in the interest of protecting their national
14 sovereignty and curbing international tensions by encouraging
15 the repealing of the 9th Article to the Japanese National Diet.

16 Resolved, by the Congress here assembled that: Japan shall be hereby
17 politically aided in the repeal of the 9th Article in its
18 Constitution to allow a safer pacific region for the
19 United States, Japan and all other allies in the region.

The Cuban Normalization Act Of 2024

1 Be it enacted by this Palm Beach Catholic Forensic League Student Congress here
2 assembled that:

3 **Article I:** In order to improve economic relations with Cuba, the United States shall
4 repeal H.R. 5323 (The Torricelli Act,) H.R. 927 (the Helms-Burton Act,)31
5 CFR 515 (Cuban Asset Control Regulations,) and the Cuban section of the
6 Trade Sanctions Reform and Export Enhancement Act of 2000. We shall
7 strike down Proclamation 3447, Embargo on all trade with Cuba, by
8 President John. F. Kennedy. Restrict arms and munitions sales to the
9 Cuban regime and its affiliates, pursuant of AECA; P.L. 90-629; 22 U.S.C.
10 A new VISA requirement for travel to and from Cuba, in place of the
11 current licensing system shall be implemented.

12 **Article II:** Arms and munitions as defined by the EPA are, “all ammunition products
13 and components produced for or used by the armed forces for national
14 defense and security. The licensing system is defined as a system
15 restrictive system solely directed at Cuba to control the flow of movement and
16 migration. One must obtain a government license to travel to Cuba.

17 **Article III:** This bill will become effective upon passage.

18 **Article IV:** The Office Of Foreign Assets Controls (OFAC) shall oversee the rollback
19 of limitations on trade, financial transfers, and remittances to individuals
20 on the island of Cuba. The U.S. Citizenship and Immigration Services
21 Office of the State Department will oversee VISA applications. The arms
22 and munitions restriction shall be overseen by the Department of State.

23 **Article V:** All other laws that are in conflict with this new policy shall hereby be
24 declared null and void.

9 **Article IV:** The Federal Elections Commission (FEC) will oversee this
10 enforcement of this legislation.

11 a. Any Super PAC that does not comply with this will be
12 terminated.

13 **Article V:** All other laws that conflict with this new policy shall hereby be
14 declared null and void.

A Bill to Improve Juvenile Detention Centers Rehabilitations

1 BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

2 **Article I.** Juvenile detention center across the nation shall make influential changes
3 to programs to promote the education and improvement of mental health
4 of juvenile prisoners.

5 **Article II.** Detention centers will be required to include educational programs and
6 mandatory mental health sessions into the daily schedule.

7 A) Educational Programs will be defined as classes taught alongside
8 the education programs of the state, where the center resides.
9 Staffed with a teacher to every 30 youth prisoners in each age
10 group.

11 B) Mandatory Mental Health sessions shall be defined as a session
12 presided over one full-time licensed professional for every 150
13 youth. Alongside part-time staffing.

14 **Article III.** The departments of Health and Human Services and Education will
15 oversee the implementation of Educational Programs and Mental Health
16 Sessions respectively.

17 A) Funding for this legislation will be derived from 10% of the
18 Department of Defense budget.

19 **Article IV.** Implementation of this bill will begin once passed.

20 **Article V.** All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null
21 and void.

A Bill to Ban the Use of High Fructose Corn Syrup

1 Be it enacted by this Palm Beach Catholic Forensic League Student Congress here
2 assembled that:

3 Article I: High Fructose Corn Syrup shall be banned from being used as an additive
4 in foods and beverages produced in the United States.

5 Article II: High Fructose Corn Syrup (HFCS), is a sweetener made from corn that is
6 chemically altered with enzymes to convert its starches to simple sugars,
7 notably fructose.

8 Article III: The Food and Drug Administration (FDA) will be in charge of overseeing
9 the implementation of this legislation.

10 A. The FDA will provide a subsidy of \$100,000 for each leading
11 manufacturer of High Fructose Corn Syrup, to make up for the loss
12 in the industry and prevent negative economic impact.

13 Article IV: This legislation will take effect on July 1, 2025.

14 Article V: All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.
