5	Section 2.	The "g	gag rule" prohibits health care providers serving in Title X funded	
6		institu	tions from referring patients for abortion care. The "physical	
7		separa	tion rule" requires separate facilities, separate staff, separate	
8		accour	nting and medical records, and separate workstations for abortion	
9		and no	on-abortion related care.	
10	Section 3.	This le	egislation will be implemented by the Office of Population Affairs.	
11		A.	Title X clinics will not be required to provide family planning	
12			services.	
13		B.	This legislation will not fund abortions in compliance with the	
14			Hyde Amendment. All additional funds will be distributed for	
15			contraceptives, screening, and other health services.	
16		C.	The funding will be distributed on a population-based need basis	
17			that does with no accounting for the specific family planning	
18			services a given clinic provides.

# A Bill to Create a Pathway to Citizenship

2	Section 1.	The U	United States will begin a two year long amnesty program and
3		reform	n the immigration process to establish a pathway to citizenship
4	Section 2.	The a	mnesty program will give Lawful Permanent Residency or a
5		"Gree	en Card" to undocumented immigrants who have no felonies, and
6		who c	can prove they have lived in the US for a minimum of ten years.
7		An as	ylum cap or quota is defined as a limit on the number of asylum
8		seeke	rs allowed into the country every year.
9	Section 3.	The D	Department of Justice (DOJ) and the Department of Homeland
10		Secur	ity (DHS) are charged with implementation of this bill.
11		A.	There will no longer be asylum caps or quotas.
12		B.	Lawful Permanent Residences will no longer be deportable.
14		C.	Immigration and Customs Enforcement must receive an arrest
15			warrant in order to pursue a deportable immigrant.
16		D.	Immigrants can no longer be barred from applying for legal status
17			based on illegal entry charges alone.
18		E.	\$300 million will be allocated every year to the DOJ for a
19			public defender system to be established in immigration courts.
20	Section 4.	This l	egislation will go into effect at the beginning of fiscal year 2022.

# A Bill to Fully Fund Mail-In Voting

1	Be it enacted	nacted by this Florida Forensic League Student Congress here assembled that:		
2	Section 1.	The United States federal government will fully fund mail-in voting for		
3		elections that include at least one federal office. Additionally, enough		
4		money will be allocated to the United States Postal Service to cover the		
5		costs of ensuring that mail-in ballots are postmarked and received on time		
6	Section 2.	A mail-in or absentee ballot is defined as a vote cast by someone who is		
7		unable or unwilling to attend the official polling station to which the voter		
8		is normally allocated.		
9	Section 3.	This legislation will be enforced by the Federal Election Commission,		
10		Postmaster General, and the Department of Justice.		
11		A. States will be required to offer mail-in voting for any person who		
12		requests it regardless of the reason. Failure to provide a voter with		
13		a properly requested mail-in ballot will result in fines for state		
14		governors and state election officials.		
15		B. Anyone caught tampering with mail-in ballots will be sentenced to		
16		prison for no less than two years.		
17	Section 4.	This bill will go into effect on January 1, 2022.		
18	Section 5.	All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

## A Bill to Provide Tuition-Free College Education

2	Section 1.	The U	JS federal government will guarantee access to tuition-free college
3		educa	ation for citizens with a family income of less than \$110,000/year.
4	Section 2.	"Tuit	ion-free" will include tuition, institution fees, course fees, and
5		textbo	ooks required for the completion of each college course.
6	Section 3.	The U	JS Department of Education will oversee the implementation and
7		overs	ight of this bill.
8		A.	Colleges included in the tuition-free program will be publicly
9			funded 2-year and 4-year public colleges and universities,
10			community colleges, technical colleges, and all minority-serving
11			institutions.
12		B.	Each institute of higher learning receiving federal funds will
13			submit a biennial plan detailing its efforts at tuition cost
14			containment for approval.
15		C.	Following the initial year of enrollment, students must make
16			satisfactory progress toward graduation each year to continue in
17			the program. Funds will be available for a maximum of 5 years or
18			the completion of a 4-year degree, whichever comes first.
19	Section 4.	This l	bill will go into effect on January 1, 2022.

2	Section 1.	The U	.S Federal Government will hereby decide to remain a part of the	
3		World	Health Organization (WHO) and reinstate previously frozen	
4		fundin	g over a period of 5 months.	
5	Section 2.	"Previ	ously frozen funding" is the \$893 million funding program to the	
6		WHO	which was terminated in April 2020	
7	Section 3.	The U	nited States Agency for International Development, Department of	
8		State,	and Department of Health and Human Services will be tasked with	
9		the im	plementation of this bill.	
10		A.	The USAID will provide a report to the US House Subcommittee	
11			of Appropriations every three months regarding the integrity and	
12			efficacy of the WHO.	
13		B.	If the US House Subcommittee of Appropriations deems failure in	
14			funding for the WHO based on the report, all aid will be retracted	
15			from the multilateral organization.

### A Bill to Increase the National Tax on Gasoline

1	Be it enacted	by this Florida Forensic League Student Congress here assembled that:	
2	Section 1.	The United States shall increase the national tax 30% on every gallon of	
3		gasoline and diesel. The collected tax will go towards FEMA and the	
4		Department of Transportation.	
5	Section 2.	FEMA is defined as the Federal Emergency Management Agency. The tax	
6		shall be collected by the various states' Department of Transportation.	
7	Section 3.	The United States Department of Transformation and the Office of	
8		Management and Budget will work together to enforce this bill.	
9		A. The federal tax will be increased to 23.92 cents on every gallon of	
10		gasoline and 31.72 cents on every gallon of diesel.	
11		B. 50% of the collected tax will go to FEMA to help fund the	
12		National Preparedness System, and the other 50% will go to the	
13		Department of Transportation for the purpose of creating and fixing	
14		climate change safe infrastructure.	
15	Section 4.	This legislation shall go into effect on January 1, 2022.

2	Section 1.	The U	nited States Department of Agriculture (USDA) shall halt certain	
3		subsid	ies and redirect resources towards sustainable agriculture.	
4		A.	The USDA Risk Management Agency, Federal Crop Insurance	
5			Corporation, and Commodity Credit Corporation will close.	
6		B.	The following subsidy programs will be terminated: Agriculture	
7			Risk Coverage, Price Loss Coverage, Conservation Stewardship	
8			Program, Conservation Reserve Program, Market Facilitation	
9			Program, Price Support Programs, and Agricultural Trade	
10			Promotion Program.	
11		C.	All surrendered assets and saved funds will be redirected to	
12			sustainable agriculture and child nutrition programs. At least 50%	
13			of sustainable agriculture funds must be granted to small farms.	
14	Section 2.	Sustain	nable agriculture is defined in in 7 U.S. Code§ 3103 and includes	
15		but is	not limited to vertical farming, organic farming, and agroforestry.	
16		Small	farms are defined as those with gross cash farm income under	
17		\$250,0	000.	
18	Section 3.	The U	SDA is responsible for the implementation of this legislation. The	
19		USDA	Office of Inspector General will submit a biennial report to the	
20		House	Committee on Agriculture regarding the allocation of funds	
21	Section 4.	This le	egislation will take effect October 1, 2021.

## A Bill to Help Fund the Grand Inga Dam Project

1	Be it enacted	by this Florida Forensic League Student Congress here assembled that:
2	Section 1.	A total of \$10 billion shall be appropriated to the Agency for the
3		Development and Promotion of Grand Inga over the period of 10 years.
4	Section 2.	The Agency for the Development and Promotion of the Grand Inga is the
5		agency within the Democratic Republic of Congo government tasked with
6		overseeing and implementing construction of the Grand Inga Dam. The
7		Grand Inga Dam Project is a project to build a series of seven
8		hydroelectric power stations at the site of Inga Falls.
9	Section 3.	The United States Agency for International Development (USAID) will
10		oversee the implementation of this legislation. Upon any recorded misuse
11		of aid, this legislation and all further aid for this project will be suspended
12	Section 4.	This bill will be implemented October 1, 2021.
13	Section 5.	All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

1	Whereas,	In 2017, Palestine was reported to have paid \$345 million to convicted
2		terrorists and their families; and
3	Whereas,	terrorist organizations like Hamas are strengthened through this
4		continuous stream of aid; and
5	Whereas,	Hamas has killed upwards of 1900 civilians and made the Gaza Strip a
6		violent region; and
7	Whereas,	the United States has already levied economic sanctions on the Palestinian
8		government and specific officials; and
9	Whereas,	these sanctions have created massive strain on Palestine's economy and
10		pressured Palestine to pursue negotiations with the United States; now,
11		therefore, be it
12	Resolved,	By the Congress here assembled that the United States open negotiations
13		with Palestine and offer sanction relief on the condition that Palestine
14		limits its support towards terrorist organizations.

## A Resolution to Rejoin the Trans-Pacific Partnership

1	Whereas,	The Trans-Pacific Partnership, or TPP, is a free trade agreement between
2		Canada, Mexico, Peru, Chile, New Zealand, Australia, Singapore,
3		Malaysia, Japan, Vietnam, and Brunei, countries that border the Pacific
4		Ocean; and
5	Whereas,	On January 23, 2017, President Trump signed to withdraw from the TPP;
6		and
7	Whereas,	The Obama administration and many trade economists argued that the deal
8		lowered tariffs and increased market access, which would have reduced
9		prices for consumers, spurred cross-border investment, and boosted U.S.
10		exports; and
11	Whereas,	The TPP was set to become the world's largest free trade deal, covering 40
12		percent of the global economy; and
13	Whereas,	Data from the U.S. International Trade Commission shows that U.S. trade
14		with TPP countries amounted to more than \$1.S trillion, or about 40
15		percent of all U.S. trade, before withdrawing; and
16	Whereas,	The United States would greatly benefit from the TPP; now, therefore, be
17		it
18	Resolved,	By the Congress here assembled that the United States should rejoin the
19		Trans-Pacific Partnership as it is a comprehensive deal that would provide
20		economic growth.
